Despite the recorded loss we are in a good position, all outstandings paid, rent paid and funds put into an allocation account for the new Electronic Gaming Machine rules in 2022.

Appeals

A total of \$96,581.00 was raised this year, down on last year due to the timing of ANZAC Day, Easter and School Holidays. A great effort by our volunteers and Appeals Officers Mick Lanigan, Terry Barnes and Hector Hart.

Ceremonies

The Sub-Branch is responsible for running three ANZAC Day Ceremonies. A Dawn Service at Eltham which attracts over 7,000 people, an early morning at Heidelberg which attracts about 2,000 people and finally a mid-morning march and Ceremony in Montmorency which attracts about 3,000 people.

The Dawn Service is run with the assistance of Eltham Rotary who provide great support.

The involvement of local school children in all the ceremonies helps keep the ANZAC spirit alive.

A Remembrance Day Service is held on 11 November at the Eltham Cenotaph and crowds are increasing each year at this ceremony. Thanks to the Eltham Men's Shed for their assistance with this ceremony.

It is due to the dedicated work of Cait Chubb that all the Services are run so smoothly. Thank you Cait for your dedication to this task.

Building and assets

This year the Sub-Branch continued a program of improvements to the Club but due to limited finance these have to be prioritised

Early in the year the outside signage and repairs to the old balcony were completed thanks to dedication of Vice President Mini Munro.

In July I applied for Victorian Government grant to replace our inefficient air conditioners which were over 25 years old.

On 22 November our local State Member for Eltham Vicky Ward announced to our members that we were to receive a grant of \$30,000 from Minister for Veterans, Dept. Premier and Cabinet. This gesture from the Government was a significant input of funds for our building.

Vice President Mini Munro will follow up installation in 2020.

There was provision of Gas Heating to Smokers' balcony

In December our new Manager Michael McCombe ordered new furniture which should arrive early in 2020.

Memorabilia

An important function for any RSL and the Montmorency-Eltham Sub-Branch has very large and varied collection this has come about by the dedicated work of Peter Randle.

As well as talks to School children and arranging displays in 2019 Peter and a group of volunteers finished cataloguing the collection.

Their work was so good they were a finalist in Museum Victoria Awards for Excellence in Cataloguing and duly received a Highly Commended Award. Well done to Peter and his crew.

Veteran and community welfare

It is pleasing to note that in accordance with our objectives the following was achieved in 2019

 Volunteer work organised by the Sub-Branch for the benefit of veterans totalled 6122.5 hours this equates to a value of \$240,920.38 (rate set by Volunteering Victoria based on ABS figures)

- A review of the Sub-Branch Welfare & Charity Business Plan indicates that in 2019 the Sub-Branch aided Veterans and local communities exclusive of volunteer hours to the value of \$310,378.00
- A total of \$551,298.38 value of work and assistance to veterans and the local community
- This includes provision of meal vouchers for use or raffles to organisations such as Sherbourne Primary School, Diamond Valley Vietnam Veterans, Montmorency Bowling Club, Bundoora Ladies Golf Club, RSL Vic Diggers Golf Day.
- Funding to support a perpetual ANZAC Award to the Eltham College Music Dept
- \$1000.00 to Padre Mark Dunn for "Cam's Cause" in memory of Cpl Cameron Baird VC MC.
 To provide a camp for children of deceased Afghanistan veterans.
- Donation \$50,000.00 to purchase a specially modified vehicle for a local Afghanistan Veteran.
- Visits from local schools and to Schools and attending and organising ANZAC services at Schools.
- Sponsorship of Montmorency Bowls Club and Eltham Bowls Club.
- Provision of meeting rooms to various local community and sporting clubs.
- Contact with all veterans and widows over 80 years old twice a year to identify problems which are then referred to our Welfare Officer.
- Funding of \$3600 to the child of veteran for medical treatment.
- Sponsorship of Gallipoli Cup tennis tournament for juniors.
- Support for the School of Signals technician course and provision of an award for the graduating 'Soldier of Merit'
- Provision of subsidized meals for veterans and seniors to prevent social isolation
- Provision of garden maintenance for older veterans and widows.
- Donation \$5,000.00 to Austin Health Repatriation Hospital to assist training for veterans with PTSD.
- Running a project for VCAL students from Montmorency Secondary College in 'Stories from my Life" with students investigating the life of veterans. (See photo below)

TREASURER'S REPORT

I wish to acknowledge the assistance given to me in the Treasurer's role by Vin Butcher and Libby Annett throughout the year. In particular the efforts by Libby to ensure everything was in order.

The auditors William Buck Audit (Vic) Pty Ltd have completed the audit of the 2019 accounts and completed the financial reports for the 3 entities of the Montmorency-Eltham RSL Sub -Branch. The audit was completed to satisfaction of both parties.

The audited reports of the 3 entities were available for perusal at the door. If you would like to have copies please ask the Secretary Mr John Macleod at the end of the meeting

MERSL Sub-Branch Inc. Trading

A loss of \$82,826.00 was incurred for 2019 compared to a profit of \$373,966 for 2018. Although not good the Club has performed reasonably well in 2019.

All out-standings including rent were paid in 2019 and the Sub-Branch finished the year with healthy account balances plus \$162,521.00 in an Allocation account being provision of funds for possible purchase of our own floor of EGMs in 2022. An amount of \$21,926 was paid during the year towards the new gaming licences due in 2022.

There was amortisation of intangible assets i.e. gaming machines entitlements of \$144,088 in 2019. The Bar and Meal revenue were up while Gaming was revenue down for the year

Total Members Funds retained earnings as at 31 December 2019 was \$1,605,241.

MERSL Sub-Branch Inc. Patriotic Fund

A loss of \$14,266 for the year

A grant of \$25,000 was received from the Victorian Government through the Minister for Veterans, Department Premier and Cabinet, to replace two air conditioners in 2020 with a further \$5,000.00 to be paid on completion.

New rules about items such as furniture etc come into force on the 1 January 2020 with such items will now be part of Trading.

Total Members Funds as at the 31 December 2019 was \$4,017,488.

MERSL Sub-Branch Inc. General Appeals Fund

An amount of \$95,118.00 was raised from the ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day Appeals in 2019 this down \$12,895.00 on 2018 Appeals. Mainly due to poorer ANZAC Badge sales caused by the late Easter and school holidays. Other income of \$1,549.00 was received. The Club receives 50% from sales which is spent entirely on veteran's welfare.
